The Vicar Writes



The vision of Isaiah reveals many deep truths about God that can inspire us into deep contemplation. To begin with, the Lord is never alone but is surrounded by the heavenly host. The basis of a Trinitarian understanding of God is that the Supreme One exists in community. Father (source of being), Son (the Christ, King and guide of creation) and Holy Spirit (all-pervading Spirit and Truth who is equally present everywhere in whom everything is sustained and who is the substance of existence).

According to the understanding of God as Trinity, everything in creation has its relationship with the Lord and everyone has their

rightful dignity as a child of God (the whole earth is full of His Glory). A second lesson is revealed where we see Isaiah feeling unworthy and unclean. An angel flew over to him and touched Isaiah's mouth with a burning coal saying your sin is forgiven. Here we see how the angel acts as an agent of the Lord, one who personifies the Lord's will. God empowers Isaiah through the angel to act as His representative on earth. With his sins forgiven, Isaiah is able to hear and understand, to see and perceive God. What does it mean to be forgiven? It means to be allowed to enter a new phase of understanding and status of life that keeps God in the centre.

How often do we cut God out of our lives because we forget that we are a part of God? As God's children we cannot possibly be separated from Him, and yet our feeling of unworthiness, like Isaiah's hold us back. It often takes the touch of an angel either earthly or heavenly to put a coal to our mouth and awaken our realisation that we belong to God and God belongs to us. Paul had a similar realisation that led him to say that by the grace of God I am what I am and that the grace of God at work in him made his efforts successful.

For the first disciple Simon Peter the Lord gave special grace in the form of miracles to encourage the future head of the Church in his own spiritual development and self-understanding. Today we hear how the Lord asked Peter to take his boat out again and try one more time for a catch of fish. Peter had been disappointed and had past the point of giving up. The Lord encouraged him to take the boat out one more time. Peter trusted the Lord's judgement, he had faith enough in Christ that he was a true master, a divine emissary of God. Peter followed the instruction of Christ and it bore fruit. All though his time with the Lord Peter saw that whenever he followed what the Lord said things worked out. That is the basis of faith, to have the courage to follow the instructions of the Lord and enough belief in the Lord and in yourself that you can do it.

If we fall short it's because we have been unable to see Christ in our journey. We have to develop the understanding that God is in every part of our journey, not just at the end. The end time is now, it has always been now. God exists in eternity and that is now and forever. If our minds and hearts are open we may see the Lord is with us always, the Lord accepts us always. God shares our journey, our sufferings and our joys and His invitation is to enter deeply into His infinite joys and everlasting life. It is the birthright of everyone to have this, only our self-doubt stands in the way, so let's be bold enough to drop it and live in faith and love.
